Dear Colleagues and Friends of CIS:

As the new chair of CIS starting this fall, I am pleased to welcome you back to Berkeley, and to announce a full and very exciting lineup for the 2007-08 academic year. Our first event will be the screening of "Senkyo" (Campaign), an insightful and humorous look at Japanese electioneering (hosted by Prof. Steven Vogel) in September.

In addition to great speakers for our regular Friday lecture series, which will feature topics ranging from urban planning to the anthropology of haiku groups to Japanese electoral politics to Japanese American performance art, we are planning two major Japan-centered conferences for the spring. The first, on Japanese archaeology, has been organized by Prof. Junko Habu, who received a major grant from the Luce Foundation for this project. The second, organized by Prof. Alan Tansman, will be on Japanese film studies.

Other events to look forward to are the annual Maruyama Lecture and Seminar, which will be presented this year by Berkeley's own Judith Butler (Elliot Professor of Rhetoric & Comparative Literature). We will also be sponsoring a number of collaborative events with various Cal departments as well as units like the Cal Performances, the Berkeley Art Museum and the Pacific Film Archives, so please look out for them!

This is an exciting time for Japanese studies at Cal as well. This year, Cal will be holding a search for a position in Japanese history. We will also be celebrating the opening of the new East Asian Library, which means that our preeminent Japan collection will now have a worthy home. As always, we are honored to host distinguished faculty from Japan this year, including Prof. Naoki Hiraishi (Professor Emeritus of History of Japanese Political Thought at the University of Tokyo), who will be giving a lecture fall semester. This is a rare opportunity to hear some of Japan's most important scholars, so I hope you'll have a chance to catch them.

Last but not least, 2008-09 will be the 50th anniversary of the Center for Japanese Studies. We hope to put together a number of special events to celebrate our achievements as one of the oldest and most active research centers in the nation for the study of Japan. We are planning to use this moment in Cal history to reflect on the state of Japanese studies more broadly, and will be hosting a year-long celebration of our work.

We are looking forward to a great year, and hope to see or hear from all of you. I urge you to show your support for Japanese Studies at Cal by donating to CJS, volunteering for center events, and showing up to all of our programs that pique your interest.

International Dissertation Research Fellowships

The International Dissertation Research Fellowship (IDRF) program supports distinguished graduate students in the humanities and social sciences conducting dissertation research outside the United States. The program promotes research that is situated in a specific discipline and geographical region and is engaged with interdisciplinary and cross-regional perspectives. Fellowships will provide support for nine to twelve months of dissertation research. No awards will be made for proposals requiring less than nine months of on-site research. The 2008 IDRF fellowship must be held for a single continuous period within the eighteen months between July 2008 and December 2009. **Deadline: November 6.** http://programs.ssrc.org/idrf/
